

"We Shall Overcome" is a gospel song which became a protest song and a key anthem of the American civil rights movement. The song is most commonly attributed as being lyrically descended

from "I'll Overcome Some Day", a hymn by Charles Albert Tindley that was first published in 1901. The modern version of the song was first said to have been sung by tobacco workers led by Lucille Simmons during the 1945–1946 Charleston Cigar Factory strike in Charleston, South Carolina. In 1947,

Closing Scripture from the Prophets Amos and Micah

Amos "Seek good and not evil, that you may live; and so the Lord, the God of hosts will be with you just as you have said. Hate evil and love good, and establish justice in the gate, it may be that the Lord, the God of hosts will be gracious to the remnant of Joseph"

I hate I despise your festivals, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies. Even though you offer me your burnt offerings and grain offerings I will not accept them; and the off springs of wellbeing of your fatted animals I will not look upon. Take away from me the noise of your songs, I will not listen to the melody of your harps. But let justice roll down like waters and the righteousness like an ever-flowing stream

Micah: "The Lord shall judge between many peoples, and shall arbitrate between strong nations far away; they shall beat their spears into pruning hooks, nation shall not life up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more, but they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig tree and no one shall make them afraid' for the mouth of the Lord of hosts has spoken."
