# What is Juneteenth?

According to the official website of the historic event, Juneteenth is "the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States.

Other than marking a pivotal date of significance in American history, Juneteenth also serves as an opportunity for African Americans to cherish their culture and heritage. More than 155 years ago, Juneteenth celebrates the liberation of African Americans from slavery in the U.S. The reason for it being celebrated on June 19<sup>th</sup> is because, on this day in 1865, when Major General Gordon Granger of the Union Army landed in Texas, he brought the news that the Civil War had ended and all slaves were free. The proclamation declaring the abolishment of slavery was issued by President Abraham Lincoln on January 1, 1863, in the nation's third year of an ongoing civil war known

as the Emancipation Proclamation, it declared that 'all persons held as slaves within any State or designated part of a State.....shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free.' Grangers arrival at Texas was to force this decree, which had originally gone into effect two years earlier.
