Christmas Is Not Over

For many, the celebration of Christmas has come and gone. But for those of us who want to go deeper and celebrate "nativity," the message is as current as the morning news.

We believe Christmas is more than one day on the calendar.

For many faithful followers of Jesus, it is a way of life.

We don't actually know the date of Jesus' birth but we do know that the Romans celebrated the winter solstice on December 25th. When Emperor Constantine made Christianity legal the church accepted that date. Jesus was associated with "light."

Jesus said he was the light of the world (John 8.12) A "light" that the darkness of the world has never (and will never) put out.

As I suggested to our congregations at Christmas Eve worship seriously consider that "every day" is the birthday of Jesus. Since we don't know the exact date, every day is our opportunity to experience the "new birth" that Jesus offers to us.

It is not enough simply to go to Bethlehem. Or sing a hymn about Bethlehem. We must get inside of the significance of Bethlehem and in a real sense get inside the manger ourselves.

What was (what is) it like to experience birth and be totally dependent on others for life? We asked our Christmas Eve congregations "what does Jesus want for Christmas?"

Actually, don't forget it is his birthday not mine or yours.

Jesus wants us to accept his love totally and then, as we "follow him," share it with others, especially the un-loveable as we build bridges of understanding and be makers of peace.

As we have said so many times in morning worship, we are called (Matthew 6.10) to bring heaven down to the earth.

It would be a lot easier for Jesus to get us into heaven than his desire to get heaven into us. Yet, that is exactly what he desires. Maybe accepting this challenge is giving Jesus what he really wants for Christmas.

As followers of Jesus, it is very important that we stay in touch with each other. Remember to call, send cards, visit, and pray for these members of our church family who are under the weather.



GOD'S WORK FOR HIS PEOPLE

As they say, the Lord works in mysterious ways.

I have been doing some internet research lately and have had an opportunity to learn a bit about Araminta "Minty" Ross, the woman that we know as **Harriet Tubman**, born into slavery sometime between 1815 and 1825.

As a teenager, she was severely injured when she was accidentally hit in the head with a metal weight. Afterwards, she experienced painful headaches and seizures and began to experience visions and vivid dreams, which she interpreted as revelations from God. These resulted in her passionate faith and commitment to do God's work. She was inspired



by the Old Testament tales of deliverance, which guided her actions throughout her life.

As an escaped slave herself, Tubman made use of the network known as the Underground Railroad, leading other escaped slaves along the Choptank River here in Maryland and into Pennsylvania, a journey of nearly 90 miles.

Over 11 years, Tubman returned repeatedly to the Eastern Shore of Maryland, rescuing some 70 enslaved people in about 13 expeditions.

Had she never suffered that head injury, the woman nicknamed "Moses" may have never been inspired to lead those 70 slaves to freedom as she claimed that God influenced her to do.

Consider how differently history may have evolved had she avoided being hit by that metal weight. Consider her impact on the lives of her fellow slaves.

If you ever need an example of the mysterious ways that God works in even the most humble of us, look no further than the incredible work of this amazing woman.
