THE JOY OF BEING THE CHURCH

As we welcome the fall I would like you to take a church challenge. What is the difference between "going to church" and "being the church?"

At Mount Zion we have made a distinction (an important faith distinction") on the difference between the two.

For some "going to church" means about the same thing as "going to see a play." First, you have to ask yourself the question "do I want to go to the church this morning or is there something else I would rather do?" Thus, you can take it or leave it.

Tragically, for some "going to church" means singing a couple of hymns, reading a Bible lesson, listening to a preacher, hearing an anthem, giving some money and then going home. Sadly, for some, what we do on Sunday morning has nothing to do with their daily lives. Far too often for those who simply "go to church" if they hear something they don't like, or it irritates them or they disagree with it you can always "walk away!"

On the other hand "being the church" means you never just walk away. It's not just about me. Rather, it's about Jesus and me. For Christ Jesus followers we are called to "internalize" the "life, message, death and resurrection of our Lord in our lives." His life is lived in me. His message becomes my message. It doesn't end when the worship service is over and I walk out of the church doors.

When Jesus commands me to tear down the walls of separation and build bridges of understanding, that becomes my message! When Jesus commands me to love even those I radically disagree with, that becomes my message! When Jesus commands me to help bring the Kingdom of God to earth, I say, "Where do I start?"

The joy of "being the church" is more than a building, or a preacher, or even a program. It is a personal relationship with the "living God!"


"I think of the trees and how simply they let go, let fall the riches of a season, how without grief (it seems) they can let go and go deep into their roots for renewal and sleep," wrote the poet and novelist May Sarton in "Journal of a Solitude."

And it's from Sarton that we get the stoic wisdom of the trees and their lesson in change. "Imitate the trees," she wrote. "Learn to lose in order to recover, and remember that nothing stays the same for long, not even pain, psychic pain. Sit it out. Let it all pass. Let it go."
